Reminders from the Little Chute Volunteer Fire Department *by Fire Chief Mark Jansen*

With warmer weather here or at least just around the corner I would like to address the open burning ordinance (see below). This ordinance was developed so the residents of our community could enjoy having a campfire within the village limits while not endangering public safety or annoying other residents. The rules are fairly simple and easy to follow, they are not meant to allow you to burn leaves or brush, construction materials, trash etc. also it is not meant for bonfires. If the Fire Department receives a complaint we are required to respond and at that point determine if there is an issue, if an issue is found we will require the fire to be extinguished and also determine if it will require a fine. My challenge to our residents is to follow the rules set forth in this ordinance, invite your neighbors over to the campfire and enjoy.

Village of Little Chute Open Burning Ordinance

The ordinance reads, in part, as follows:

1. Only wood or charcoal fuels may be utilized.
2. Fire containment devices including pits shall not be permitted within 25' of any combustible or structure, or within 10' of a lot line unless mutually agreed upon by the neighboring property owners
3. The fire must be attended at all times by an adult with access to a fire extinguisher or garden hose as a means to extinguish fire readily available.
4. No fires are permitted if the wind speed exceeds 10 miles per hour.
5. Upon completion, the fire must be completely extinguished to prevent accidental reigniting.
6. Fire pits or other fire containment devices shall not exceed four feet in diameter.
7. Flames shall be kept below four feet in height above the pit or other fire containment device.

The Fire Chief, his designee, or law enforcement officials are authorized to require discontinuance of burning if they determine that smoke emissions are offensive to occupants of surrounding properties. Use care and have consideration for your neighbors when you have outdoor fires.

Working Smoke Detectors Save Lives

In the event of a fire smoke detectors can save your life and those of your loved ones. Many people who die in fires die from breathing in the poisonous gases and smoke. A smoke detector acts as “**your nose at night**” to detect smoke and provides an early warning signal so you can escape. Smoke detectors are the single most important means of preventing house and apartment fire deaths and are one of the best safety features you can have to protect yourself, your family and your home.



Installation: Always follow the manufacturer’s installation instructions when installing a smoke detector because each brand is different. Smoke detectors should be installed on the ceiling or on walls 6 to 8 inches below the ceiling. Since smoke and many deadly gasses rise, installing your smoke detectors at the proper level will provide you with the earliest warning possible. Install smoke detectors on every level of your home, including the basement. For extra safety, install smoke detectors both inside and outside the sleeping area.

Maintenance: Smoke detectors are easy to maintain:

- Test every smoke detector monthly
- Replace the old batteries with new batteries at least once a year. An easy way to remember is when you change your clock in the fall or spring for Daylight Savings Time.
- Replace the batteries if your smoke detector starts making a chirping noise.
- Keep the smoke detector clean. Dust and debris can prevent them from working properly, so vacuum over and around your smoke detector regularly.
- Never disable your smoke detector if it goes off due to cooking or other non-fire causes. You may

not remember to put the batteries back. Instead, leave the batteries in place and clear the air by waving a towel near the detector. The detector may have to be moved to a different location if this occurs too frequently.

- Replace the smoke detector after about eight to ten years. Like most electronic devices, smoke detectors wear out. Always follow the manufacturer's instruction for replacement.

NEWS FROM THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

YARD WASTE DISPOSAL

The Village no longer has free pickup of yard waste during the spring and summer. However, in the fall we will still pick up loose leaves in the curb.

Beginning Wednesday, April 24, 2013, the crew will again pick up yard waste that is bagged with a \$2 sticker attached to each bag on Wednesdays only.

For residents who don't want to purchase yard waste stickers with curbside pickup of yard waste, we have a yard waste site available for use. Residents may come to the Municipal Services Building at 1940 Buchanan Street, Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. to reactivate their access control card for \$5.00 or to purchase a new access control card for \$20.00 (cash or checks accepted).

The yard waste site will not be available for use, however, until April 15, 2013, or whenever it is deemed to be dry and usable.

The site will be available seven days a week from sunrise to sunset to residents who **purchased an access control card until we get snow that remains on the ground.**

Only yard waste (garden debris, small hedge trimmings that are too small to bundle (6" or less in length), leaves, grass clippings, and lawn rakings) are allowed to be dropped off at this site. NO brush (over 6" in length), garbage, recycling, etc. may be dropped off at the site. Residents who don't follow these rules will have their access control card discontinued, and will not be allowed to purchase another one in the same year.

The site itself is accessed on Nixon Street. The yard is secured by an electric gate with surveillance video cameras. The Department of Public Works keeps a computer file listing the name and address of the resident purchasing the access control card. Only people living at that address will be allowed to use the same access control card.

It is unlawful to deposit grass clippings or other vegetation into the roadway.

HYDRANT FLUSHING PROGRAM

The Water Department has scheduled the following dates for their semi-annual hydrant flushing:

Monday through Thursday – April 15 – 18 and
April 22 – 25, 2013,
with possible cleanup on Fridays.



In the past, some residents have experienced problems with water discoloration during hydrant flushing. If you see the utility crew working in your area, please check your COLD WATER tap to make sure that the water is clear before washing clothes.

If you do encounter water with an off color, please run your cold water tap for about 10 minutes and the color should disappear.

Don't be alarmed if water is yellow or slightly red in color because it will not harm you. The discoloration is caused by the turbulence of the water while flushing the hydrants. Usually after about ½ hour to an hour, the discoloration will subside as the water main has a chance to settle down.

We flush hydrants twice a year to help remove sediment and iron and other minerals that settle in some of our water mains. However, the main reason we flush the hydrants is for all of our protection. We want to make sure that the fire hydrants in our distribution system all work properly.

PICKUP OF EXTRA BAGGED GARBAGE

On your LAST garbage pickup day in the month of APRIL - the crew will pick up extra garbage that is placed in plastic bags, plus large non-metal and large metal items placed curbside. PLEASE be sure to always place your garbage polycart at least 4' away from any other object.

FREE TIRE COLLECTION

The Village crew will be picking up tires from residences free of charge April 15 -18, 2013 (on your regular garbage pickup day). Four tires per household (17" or less) are acceptable. Free residential tire pickup will also take place September 16-19, 2013. **NO BUSINESS TIRES ARE ACCEPTED.**

RULES FOR BULKY NON-METAL ITEMS

Your LAST garbage pickup day of each month –

- Bulky Non-Metal items will be picked up on your last regular garbage pickup day of each month. Place them curbside by 6:00 a.m. or the night before. Do not place bulky items out earlier than the night before.
- In general, bulky items are those items that are too large to be placed in a polycart. **Bulky items do not include regular garbage that does not fit inside of your polycart.** Examples of bulky items are couches, chairs, carpeting, lawn furniture, non-metal items, etc.
- **Bags of garbage placed outside of the polycart will ONLY be picked up on your LAST garbage pickup day in the months of APRIL and DECEMBER.**
- The Village never picks up construction debris such as wood, roofing material, tiles, etc.

RULES FOR LARGE METAL ITEMS/ WHITE GOODS – QUARTERLY PICKUP

Large Metal Items include stoves, washers, dryers, swing sets, dehumidifiers, refrigerators, humidifiers, freezers, water heaters, and air conditioners.

Residents must purchase a \$10.00 sticker from the Village Hall or the Municipal Services Building for any item normally containing Freon such as refrigerators, dehumidifiers, air conditioners, freezers, etc.

Large Metal Items will be picked up every 3 months on your last regular garbage pickup day of the following months: January, April, July & October. Place them curbside 4' away from your polycart by 6:00 a.m. or the night before. According to Village Ordinance, large metal items cannot be placed out earlier than the night before.

MAIN STREET CONSTRUCTION ZONE – BULKY ITEM PICKUP

Main Street from Jackson Street to the east Village limits will be under construction with utility installations and concrete paving during most of 2013. During that time, the Department of Public Works crew is going to try and refrain from using Main Street as much as reasonably possible.

Therefore, during the reconstruction, residents living in that area on Main Street that have bulky items to dispose of need to call the Department of Public Works at 788-7395 to notify us of your address and disposable item. Your cooperation in this matter is greatly appreciated.

CONSTRUCTION MATERIALS RECYCLING

Residents of the Village of Little Chute now have another option when trying to recycle construction and demolition materials. Landfill Reduction & Recycling, 3001 E. Glendale Avenue, Appleton, is a Wisconsin DNR licensed construction and demolition recycling company. They accept sorted and mixed loads of wood, concrete, rock, brick, stone, shingles, siding, metal, and carpet. You can call them at 920-319-8118 or check out their website at www.landfillreduction.com to find out their charge fees and hours of operation.

E-WASTE RECYCLING

(computer monitors, TV's, printers, towers, copiers, fax machines, DVD's, VCR's, keyboards, tele-phones, and cell phones)

The Village crew no longer picks up electronics curbside because according to Wisconsin's electronics recycling law, disposing of electronics in the landfill is banned.

The Village crew will be looking for hidden e-waste in residents' garbage containers, and will remove them and not pick them up. **The Village will have zero tolerance with hidden e-waste**, and residents will receive a citation if we find electronics inside of their garbage container. If hidden e-waste is found in the waste stream, it could result in higher sanitation fees to the residents.

If residents go to the Outagamie County Solid Waste Facility to recycle their electronics, their fees are as follows: Monitors, laptops, TV's (smaller than 32"), printers, towers, video display devices, and fax machines - \$5.00 each; DVD's, VCR's, keyboards, mice, hard drives, speakers, flash drives, modems, and cell phones – *free of charge*. TV's 32" or larger are *not* accepted.

COMPOST BINS FOR SALE

Outagamie County has compost bins available for purchase. These bins can be picked up at the Outagamie County Department of Solid Waste located at 1419 Holland Road, Appleton from 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., Monday through Friday or 7 a.m. to 11:00 a.m. on Saturday. Compost bins are \$45.00 each (tax included).

TARPING PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

All open loads of solid waste or recycling material taken to Outagamie County Department of Solid Waste by a car, truck, trailer, or other vehicle must be secured and covered with a tarp. Any load not secured and covered with a tarp will need to pay an additional \$10.00 fee, for which a tarp will be issued, otherwise unloading will not be allowed.

PRIVATE SANITARY LATERALS ON MAIN STREET

In order to reduce the amount of clear water adversely impacting the “waste water collection/ treatment system” in terms of expense, efficiency, and overall burden on treatment facilities, the Department of Public Works is proceeding with the Village-wide Private Sanitary Lateral Program. This year the area impacted will be the portion of Main Street from Jackson Street to the east Village limits that is being reconstructed in 2013.

Property owners were notified that in the interest of health, safety, and general welfare of Village residents, it is necessary for them to complete repairs or replacement of their private sanitary lateral by May 1, 2013.

The first four phases have been a huge success in reducing the clear water infiltration into the system and has enabled the Village to meet the requirements set by the Heart of the Valley Metropolitan Sewerage District.

Since it is very cost effective to do, some property owners have also elected to have their lead water service replaced at the same time. Typically, the water service is located in the same trench as your private lateral, thereby only requiring one excavation. However, this procedure is not mandatory at this time.

PERMITS ISSUED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

The Department of Public Works requires permits to be taken out for work to be done within the street right-of-way (new and rehab sidewalk, new and rehab driveway approaches, curb openings, curb replacement, new and replacement culvert installation, requests for line and grade, Erosion Control Permits, and Storm Water Management Permits). You can obtain these permits by going to the front office at the Municipal Services Building at 1940 Buchanan Street. Our office hours are Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. We accept checks and/or cash for permit payments.

The permits obtained at the Municipal Services Building are as follows:

The intent of a permit is to make sure that sidewalks are installed in the proper location, at the correct grade, inspected, and quality concrete is being used.
- Sidewalk rehabilitation \$ 0.00





NOTIFICATION PROGRAM

The Fox Valley Metro Police Department utilizes a new communications service that allows them to send important, valuable community information directly to residents using the latest technology.

The Nixle Community Information Service allows us to create and publish messages to be delivered to subscribed residents instantly via cell phone text message and/or email. Notifications can also be accessed online at Nixle's web site at www.nixle.com. Messages may include current crime trends, local areas of concern, traffic concerns as well as other relevant safety and community event information.

The service is reliable and free for our citizens to use.

The messages can be sent specifically to residents registered within a ¼ mile radius, giving them the opportunity to receive trustworthy information relevant only to their neighborhood. Residents decide from which local agencies they want to receive information. Subscribers can also choose the way in which alerts are received, whether it is by email, text message, or over the web.

There is NO spam and no hidden cost. Standard text messaging rates do apply.

Nixle builds on the foundations of other public-to-public communication services, such as Twitter, Facebook, and MySpace, but adds a key component: security. When citizens receive information from our agency via Nixle, they know it can be trusted.

Residents of Little Chute, Kimberly and Combined Locks and those in neighboring communities can immediately begin receiving pertinent information via text message, email, and web by registering at www.nixle.com.

For previous Nixle users that signed up through the Combined Locks Police Dept. account, you will need to resign up under the Fox Valley Metro Police Dept. to get updates on FVMPD police info.

Our website www.fvmpd.org also has a recent list of Nixle messages on the front page towards the bottom which will update when messages are sent out. Our Facebook page www.facebook.com/FoxValleyMetro will also get the Nixel messages.

DON'T BE A VICTIM.....

Please partner with the FVMPD to reduce crime

1. **Lock your car doors.** Thieves often check for unlocked car doors; then rummage through cars for items to steal.
2. **Never leave items in plain sight.** If you leave valuable items such as GPS units, digital cameras, purses, wallets, and CD cases in your vehicle place them in the glove box, center console, or trunk. Then make sure to lock the vehicle.
3. **Never leave keys in car or ignition.** Not only will thieves steal your belongings but they may take your car for a joyride.

(\$17.00 after April 1st)



PARK SHELTER RENTALS

The current policy on park shelter rentals allows the public to reserve shelters up to one year in advance. ① Park shelters can be reserved for use from May through September by calling the Park & Rec Dept. at 788-7390. Information on park shelters (shelter choices, locations, pictures, rental fees) is located on the village website at www.littlechutewi.org/parks. The 2013 Summer & Fall Programs Book you received also contains information.

BRUSH PICKUP POLICY

① Please remember that all Little Chute property owners/renters must call in their property address to the Parks, Recreation, & Forestry Dept. at 788-7390 to have their address added to the brush chipping list. If calling after hours, please choose extension 202 and leave a message that you have brush out and include your complete street address. When the brush pickup list is sufficient enough to send out the chipping crew, they will be sent to the addresses on the list. If you don't call in your brush, you will not be picked up. If you hire a company to trim and/or take down trees on your property, they are responsible for brush removal; the Village will not pickup brush trimmed by a company you hired.

Brush Pickup Rules - Place your branches curbside with the cut ends facing the same direction; stack piles neatly. Mobile home park residents must bring their brush to the nearest Village street (streets within the mobile home parks do not belong to the village). Brush should never lie in the street or on the sidewalk. **KEEP BRUSH AS STRAIGHT AND AS LONG AS POSSIBLE.** Brush that is shorter (4 feet in length or less), thorny brush, and evergreen branches need to be bundled with string, not wire. Brush that is too short in length to bundle must be

disposed of as yard waste (please see public works article on yard waste disposal for more information).

DOYLE PARK POOL & SLIDE

Come enjoy the Doyle Park Pool & Slide this summer. Kids and adults of all ages will enjoy this wonderful facility. There is a small heated kid's wading pool and a large heated pool that includes two low-diving boards, one high-diving board, and a single-flume waterslide. It also features a concession stand, shaded area with tables, lounge and deck chairs, and has coin operated lockers in the changing rooms. Everyone must pay to enter the pool area, even if only watching kids at pool. If the air temperature is below 65°F the pool will not open (please call 734-0123 to check temperature). Please note that if there are less than 20 people swimming, the pool will close 15 minutes after manager's announcement. There are no refunds of admission fees due to low attendance or foul weather. **The pool will open at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday, June 1** (weather permitting).


